HPV, or human papillomavirus, is a group of 150 related viruses that can lead to 6 kinds of cancer in both men and women. Getting the HPV vaccine at age 11 or 12 protects your child from developing these types of cancers later in life.

HUMAN PAPILLOMAVIRUS (HPV)

HPV causes 33,700 cancers in the United States every year, but a safe and effective vaccine can prevent more than 90% from ever developing.

The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recommends adolescents receive both doses of the HPV vaccine between the ages of 11-12. It is also recommended for young women before 26 and young men before 21 if they were not previously vaccinated.
